As we left 2021, we thought the year of disruption had left, only to be confronted with the challenges of 2022. Many of our trustees got impacted by Covid-19 or the severe winter flu taking its round in our community. Regardless we manage to stay in touch and keep the trust machinery working – albeit of a slower steam ahead.
